

Home Learning

 Practice should be completed on a nightly basis.
- Home Learning is handed out and returned on Friday. (Reading, Mymaths, TT Rockstar, spelling and handwriting and grammar) and must be completed during the week. In addition, teachers will give additional homework if they identify further gaps in children's knowledge.

The chart shows the Book Bands expectations for children in primary phase. The expectations in Year 3 is for all pupils to become a free reader. By the end of year 3 children should be at lime, beyond lime they will be a free reader.

Daily Reading

 It is expected that children read at least 20 minutes every day and if possible, with an adult.

- Pupils reading behaviours and strategies must be recorded daily and signed everyday by a parent or carer.
- Pupils are responsible for looking after their reading record.



BOOK BAGS-every child **MUST** come to school daily with their bag.


What stays in the bags daily?

- Book Bag Books-coloured band reading books
- Individual reading book
- Library book
- Reading diary/journal
- Home Learning Book



- Teachers select and read books in the children's bags with them daily to check their reading skills and understanding of the text.
- Children also read the books inside their bags whilst in school during reading sessions.

Times Tables Practice



- 4 or 5 times a week is a good target.
- By the end of year 4 children should know all multiplication facts up to 12 x 12 and related division facts.
- Keep up the practice!"Little but often"

Packed Lunch and Water

A healthy packed lunch should contain:

- Vegetables or salad and a portion of fruit

Pupil Premium refers to funding given to schools to provide additional educational support to boost learning and achievement of pupils who may receive certain benefits or come from low income families.

Primary schools are given PP for:

- Children in Reception to Year 6 who are currently entitled to free school meals based on their family income.
- Children in Reception to Year 6 who were previously entitled to benefitsbased free school meals, even if they're no longer eligible.
- Children in care or previously in care who have been adopted, or who have a special guardianship order, a child arrangements order or a residence order.
